How do PSHE lessons help your child become GCSE ready?

- How to manage their mental and emotional wellbeing.
- Where they can go to for help and support.



Year 11: Health and Wellbeing

At the start of Year 11, students complete a health and well being unit called "How can I be successful in Year 11?"


It covers...



Preparing for Mock Exams

We are holding mock exams in the majority of subjects from 9-19 November as well as in February for Core subjects.

Mocks are really important this year for the following reasons:

- A chance to practise and hone revision skills
- Revising what has been taught so far to try and embed knowledge into students' long term memory –
 research suggests the more students revisit, revise and try to recall this knowledge, the better it gets
 embedded into memory
- Students and teachers having clear knowledge about what individual gaps are, to be able to help fill them after each mock exam

The key advice to students is 'Try your best'

Mock exams

Students will get two opportunities to sit their exams in full

Mock 1 - November

Mock 2 – February

All students should have a scientific calculator and maths equipment: black pen, pencil, rubber, ruler, compass and protractor

Papers will be marked in line with exam board expectations providing students with an accurate indication of their current level.

Revision

All students will be given a revision list

After the exam students will receive a personalised targeted revision sheet which is ragged; this gives them the relevant Hegarty Maths clips they need to complete make progress

Further practice

After February half term students will be given 1 exam paper a week

One lesson is given to start the paper and then home learning time given to complete it.

One lesson will then be allocated to go through the paper and make corrections

GCSE Combined Science: Trilogy



- Every student takes 6 GCSE Science exams
- 2 x Biology, 2 x Chemistry and 2 x Physics
- Each exam is 1 hour 15 minutes in length
- 70 marks available on each paper (16.7% of GCSE), making a total of 420 marks.
- □ 2 GCSES awarded Students will receive 2 grades from 1-9, e.g. 3-3, 5-4, 8-8.
- □ 2 levels of papers: Foundation (1-5) Higher (4-9)



GCSE Combined Science: Trilogy



Each exam focuses on a group of subject units

Biology Paper 1 will cover units:

B1: Cell Biology B2: Organisation B3: Infection and Response

B4: Bioenergetics

Chemistry Paper 1 will cover units:

C1: Atomic Structure and Periodic Table C2: Bonding and Structure

C3: Quantitative Chemistry C4: Chemical Changes C5: Energy Ch

Physics Paper 1 will cover units:

P1: Energy P2: Electricity P3: Particle Model of Matter

P4: Atomic Structure





GCSE Combined Science: Trilogy

- 40% knowledge recall, 40% application of knowledge and 20% analysing and evaluating information
- Multiple choice, structured, closed short answer,
 and open response questions.




Following Ofqual consultations, students will only answer questions on three out of four studies. There will be a mixture of compulsory and optional studies.


The compulsory study will be the Wider World Depth study: **CONFLICT & TENSION:THE INTER-WAR YEARS, 1918-1939**

Students will also answer questions on two of the remaining three optional studies and we have chosen:


- •the Period study: **DEMOCRACY & DICTATORSHIP: GERMANY, 1890-1945**


